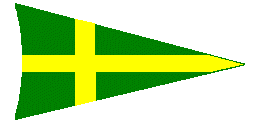




Greenwich Sailing Club

Family Sailing on Sydney Harbour



Greenwich Sailing Club is an amateur dinghy sailing club located at the end of Greenwich point and run by members on a volunteer basis. The club has excellent facilities with unobstructed views over the racing course from the club balcony. Parents can see the action and hear the club safety powerboats on the radio.

We race on Sunday afternoon from September through April. The four racing classes: MJ, F11, Laser & 29er provide good racing for young children, adolescents and adults.

The club welcomes new members and has training programs to get you on the water. The weekly Novice Training aims to introduce new members to racing and provides structured learning for beginner sailors. There is also a Race Coaching program that runs across all fleets to improve skills and competition of our experienced sailors.



Why Sail?

Great fun, great friends, and a skill for life! Looking for a family activity that the kids love and the parents love too? Sailing provides the opportunity for children to learn a new skill, make new friends and develop a responsible approach to safety on the water. Parents can sail their own boat, sail with their children, or assist the racing either on-shore or in the safety powerboats. What do I need?

Life jackets must be worn on the water and they are available from the club for training. Most sailors wear a wetsuit and foot protection. All participants must to be able to swim 50 metres comfortably.
